

Focus on Impact

High Intensity Support at Home Program (HISH)

In 2020, ROSSS became the first CSS agency to pilot an innovative, patient centered program to provide intensive care to patients and their caregivers in a specific geographic area. This program serves patients with complex care needs and who require a high level of daily care to stay home. Some of these clients are awaiting placement in Long Term Care (LTC) while others wish to remain at home as long as possible. We have seen a large number of individuals and families who are concerned about going into (or sending loved ones to) LTC facilities since COVID-19, and this program is a compassionate and flexible alternative.

This program is the first of it's kind in the Ottawa area and includes several health care professionals, providing integrated, team-based care at home. Teams include physiotherapists, occupational therapists, nurses, community paramedics, community support (personal support workers) and care coordinators. These teams develop individual care plans for each patient, and meet regularly allowing for more seamless and cohesive care.

The pilot was such a success, the program became official in 2021 and has grown to include a second geographic area. ROSSS now has 5 full-time staff to fulfill the needs of patients in Stittsville and Kemptville, with potential for several other areas identified in our rural catchment.

Focus on Impact

Emergency Response

The past several years have had no shortage of emergencies requiring swift, thoughtful repsonse. Throughout it all, ROSSS has been there to support the vulnerable members of our rural communities as well as support for fellow community support service agencies. Two notable emergencies that arose in 2021 were the summer heat wave and the downtown Ottawa occupation that lasted over 3 weeks. ROSSS was there for both, ready to serve.

During the heat wave, ROSSS helped secure and manage funding to provide emergency cooling devices for vulnerable community members in Ottawa and the surrounding area. Through this, we were able to provide air conditioners and oscillating fans for those most affected by the heat wave.

During the downtown occupation in February 2022, our sister agency The Good Companions was overwhelmed with food delivery requests from vulnerable seniors who were either unable or afraid to leave their homes. ROSSS was able to help with food hamper deliveries as well as participate in meetings twice daily with other community care and home support service providers to ensure vulnerable

community members were able to continue to receive critical care.



ROSSS is grateful to have such generous and loyal donors. Non-profits like ROSSS rely heavily on donations from the community to continue to provide the high quality services and programs offered.

While ROSSS does receive funding from various organizations, grants and government funding often come with stringent rules and guidelines on how the money can be spent. Unrestricted donations through individual donor support allows ROSSS to be nimble and flexible to meet changing and emerging needs not covered by this funding. The flexibility to meet needs as they arise is vital to our mission of ensuring all seniors and adults with disabilities in our rural catchment are able to safely stay in their homes as long as possible.

In 2021 - 2022, 3% of ROSSS' revenue was from donations, but that 3% makes a world of difference. Every donation goes directly into programs and services that support vulnerable members of our rural communities. Last year, five major donors donated a total of \$20,000 combined! This is an incredible testament to the community we serve. With some of these funds, we were able to create the Michael Daley fund, which will be used to subsidize service fees for clients who are experiencing financial constraints in accessing our services.


